We Hear God's Word

Luke 10:25-37 (CEB)

²⁵ A legal expert stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he said, "what must I do to gain eternal life?"

²⁶ Jesus replied, "What is written in the Law? How do you interpret it?"

²⁷ He responded, "You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your being, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and love your neighbor as yourself."

We Gather at the Table

Set Your Place at the Table—Whatever you have on hand to celebrate communion will work just fine, because this ancient ritual is not about what we use for this meal or where we partake of it. Instead, it is about the act of remembrance. So, gather around the table, prepare your place, and remember that Christ is in our midst.

Our Invitation—Christ came into the world ready to pour out overflowing grace and mercy. Through the abundance of Christ's love, through the generosity of Christ's sacrifice, our lives have been transformed, our brokenness mended, our hearts made new. Let us turn to our Savior that we might receive anew the healing we long for.

A Prayer for Transformation—As we gather in worship, let us take this moment to consider our needs for transformation and forgiveness. I invite you to quietly reflect on our need for grace. (A short moment of silence.)...Dear God, the creator of all things based on love, you created us in your image of love. There have been times we have fallen short of that love, not only to you but to each other and all of creation. I ask for your forgiveness and from you, present today, my siblings, sisters and brothers in Christ. I thank you for the comforting strength and compassion of the Holy Spirit to do better in bringing love and grace and all I do. In Jesus' name, we pray. Amen.+

Assurance of Grace—Scripture tells us if we are "kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, God in Christ has forgiven us". Rest assured, my friends, our sins are forgiven. Amen.+

The Words of Institution— On the night in which he gave himself up for us, he took bread, gave thanks to you, broke the bread, gave it to his disciples, and said: "Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me." When the supper was over, he took the cup, gave thanks to you, gave it to his disciples, and said: "Drink from this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, poured out for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." And so, we remember…we offer ourselves…we proclaim God's love…

Blessing Our Meal—God, you have called us to their table where the feast never ends, where love never runs out, where there is always plenty of room. As we gather as the body of Christ to receive the generous gift of this meal, may your Spirit flow freely through this bread and this cup, making holy these simple yet profound elements. We Share the Bread and the Cup – As you eat the bread, remember, "This is the body of Christ broken for you." Take and eat. As you drink the cup, remember, "This is the blood of Christ shed for you and the forgiveness of sins." Take and drink.

We Give Thanks—Almighty God, we give you thanks for the gift of our Savior's presence in the simplicity and splendor of this holy meal. Unite us with all who are fed by Christ's body and blood that we may faithfully proclaim the good news of your love and that your universal church may be a rainbow of hope in an uncertain world; through Jesus Christ our Redeemer. Amen.`
